Club Service

Club Service is concerned with activities which make a Rotary club what it is and make it possible for the club to live up to the motto "Service Above Self". It includes arranging our weekly meetings and programs, recruiting and orienting new members, preparing our club Dedicated 7:10 Rotarians

also includes responsibility for fellowship.

Community Service

Community Service is concerned with our activities focused on the local community. They include hands-on programs such as working with the Dollywood Foundation's Imagination Library, which donates books to very young children, our signature program, know as C4K (Computers for Kids), which refurbishes used computers and donates

them to deserving students (which has, to date, donated over 7,580 computers), and the collection and distribution of Thanksgiving food baskets. It also includes our many fundraising efforts, such as the annual Peach sale, a

Vocational Service / Youth Service

Vocational Service includes programs emphasizing ethics in business, excellence in performance of one's vocation, and working with youth in a variety of ways, including sending young people to an annual Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) camp, and supporting two Interact clubs at local high schools. We also award 8-10 students college scholarships each year.

International Service

Committees

Committees are the "engines of Rotary" and all our members serve on one or more committees which reflect their particular service interests. The work of the committees is guided by our Board of Directors which meets once a month and is responsible for the ongoing management of the club. Our initiation fee is \$100, and guarterly dues, including breakfast, are \$200.

As Rotarians we are part of a truly unique worldwide organization. The first Rotary club was founded in 1905 by a Chicago lawyer, Paul Harris. Since then, RI has grown to become one of the largest service clubs in the world, with over 1.2 million members in 34,282 clubs in 168 countries.
